Allin Family Tragedy Julianna, PISF 8th grader

In honor of Portsmouth's 350th anniversary celebration in 2013, we will be writing a monthly story in honor of our own Prudence Island history. In our American History studies we tie Rhode Island and Prudence Island historical events into what was happening in America during each time period.

Imagine this: Late 1700s, Prudence in ruin, charred to ashes and smoke. Farms annihilated, all residents once here now fled to safe havens on the mainland. But there was one family spared, a family so helpless that one British commander took pity on them. Two cousins, two sweet hearts, eleven children, sounds great right? Unfortunately there's a dramatic twist—eight of the thirteen were blind. This is where our story begins.

Now you may have been wondering, how could there be thirteen Allins if there are eleven kids, the two cousins and the sweethearts? Well interestingly enough the two sweethearts were actually distant cousins! Meet Thomas and Rebecca Allin. The two met while Thomas worked as a ferryman on the route from Prudence to the mainland. Thomas knew Rebecca was for him the second he saw her and as crazy as it sounds proposed to her that very afternoon, on the first day they met! Get ready for the waterworks people, she accepted! After the two were married, in the year 1750 they had their first child - a girl they named Freelove. Within the next sixteen years Rebecca and Thomas welcomed ten more children into the world, their names were Joshua, Margaret, Mary, Rebecca, Patience, Thomas Jr., Mehitable, John, Hannah, and Sweet Allin.

Only the first four out of the ten children were sighted. This is because shortly after the birth of their fourth child, Rebecca, Mrs. Allin caught a tragic disease. Though we're still not sure of what illness Rebecca Allin was infected with, we do know that it caused her to go blind, and that the next seven children were born without sight as well.


The Allins oldest boy, Joshua, fought in the first battle on Prudence in 1775. He was captured by the British and taken to be held as a prisoner of war at the Forten Prison in England. One year after Joshua was taken from his family home, British troops returned to the island to burn all remaining houses that were left. Once they found the "Blind Allins" they once again took pity on the family and spared them. Before the commander – the same one who had spared them the first time- went back to the mainland Thomas tried to convince him to send Joshua back home, and as expected complied with his pleas.

All kinds of sharks are different in color, shape, size and what they eat. The whale shark is huge with white spots and stripes. It eats tiny krill. P9 Transfer Station

Currently the transfer station situation on Island is possibly not working as well as it could. Each year in order to use the dump you must purchase your sticker by April first for the cost of \$130 at Portsmouth Town Hall. You can also purchase a 4month pass for \$60 and weekly passes for \$20 in order to use the dump. In addition to the dump sticker there are additional fees for large items, such as tires, mattresses and box springs.

There are a few reasons as to why the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee people say the current sticker program is not working. One reason would be that only 207 stickers were sold in 2012 when this island contains 450 houses. That means less than 50% of islanders are participating. It may be possible to run the dump in a more efficient way and save money. Seeing how the containers get emptied every week on the same days, it is possible they are being removed not full, which would be a waste of money. Brush could be chipped and used by residents instead of put into the dumpsters. These are just a few reasons as to why the dump isn't being run as efficiently as it could be.

The Solid Waste and Recycling Committee asked the Prudence Island Planning Commission to put a subcommittee of Prudence islanders together to help work on the issue. Gene Cardin, Kate Hibbard and Pat Rossi are our island representatives. So far they are looking into three possible solutions to lower the cost to the town and the residents. One of the three solutions is you could purchase special bags in two sizes, small and large. This means you would only be covering the cost for the bags rather than buying sticker when you may not use the dump as often. Another solution is you can buy stickers for your own bags. The third solution is you can weigh your trash and then pay by the pound. With all of these solutions recycling would be free, hopefully encouraging people to recycle more and save the planet!!

The Allins were never heard from again.

"Okay!" said Artemis.











Odila May Duffey Bearse is the oldest citizen on Prudence Island. We went to her house to interview her. She lives with Eliza, Allan, Meg, Carl, Katey and Matt. We didn't know her very well, so we were a little bit nervous, but she was really funny and kind. And she



likes to have conversations. We wrote on a whiteboard to communicate with her, because she is deaf.

We found out some things about Prudence Island when we talked to Odi. She's been coming to Prudence Island since she was 18. When she first came to Prudence, there was no electricity. Back then, when a car broke down on the island they would just move it to the side of the road and that was that. For a few years they could not go under trees, because the bugs were so bad they would drop on you. One summer there was fog for a whole month so that you couldn't see the bridge.

Odi was born in 1916. She is 96 years old and in four years she will be 100 years old. When she was little she lived in North Hampton. She lived close to where Aribella and Julianna used to live. Her father owned a restaurant. She was very popular, because she was a fun girl and because every week she got to invite a friend to her father's restaurant for lunch. Afterwards they would go to the movies and see all three movies in town. Her father lost his business in the depression and went to work at an inn as a bartender. "They loved him and he worked there for many years." "I was an only child and I was a spoiled brat, and I don't think I knew there was a depression." She loves kids and pets. Her pets are a bird named Elliot (or Bell) and a dog named Lucy. Her favorite animal is the dog. When she was a little girl she had a dog named Maxi. She would say, "Poor Maxi, poor Maxi. Maxi is sooo sick." And Maxi would throw up.

When we asked her what cool things were invented since she was little, she said, "just about everything! It's unbelievable all the inventions that have come about in my lifetime!" Her favorite invention is the washing machine. Odi said, "I don't believe there were telephones when I was born." She liked to knit and crochet. She also learned to do smocking at the YMCA with a bunch of ladies. She knew a lot of good songs, because she worked at a store on Saturdays and they played music constantly.

Odi and her husband Bud (Carlton Bearse) met because Bud's family didn't have a car, ever, so he bought a car when he went to college. But he didn't have a license. Odi had a license and so did her friend, Jane. They girls dated Bud and his friend, Bob. They drove Bud's car. Jane dated Bud and Odi dated Bob. But soon they switched, because they didn't like who they were dating. Then Odi and Bud got married and they had 5 children: Bob, Kenny, Sue and Joanne, and they had a baby that died when he was born. "Then I had Allan as a replacement." So, Odi is Allan's mom. Allan is a PISF board member. Allan is married to Eliza and Eliza is our teacher at the Prudence Island School. And this is the fascinating life of Odila Bearse.






Dead King Found in Car Park (Parking lot for you Americans)




