

Scallop Phenomenon

Have you been noticing scallop shells all over the beaches? We certainly have. But don't worry; it's just their life cycle. Scallops live for about two years, and that's why they're dying, because it's been two years since they were spat (baby scallops are called spat, haha). It's good that there are so many shells, because it means the population is greater than it has been in past years. Save the Bay has a Scallop Restoration



Program to save the species and it has been doing very well.

They bought 20,000 bay scallops from a company in New York and put them in cages in the Bay so they could get married in peace without the threat of predators and boats. They put mesh bags near the cages to catch the spat so they could count them to see if it was working. Then Save the Bay released them into the wild to make more spat (heehee).

But the biggest problem was that the eelgrass - which is the spat's favorite nursery - was getting pulled up by boats and quahoggers. The spat cling onto the upper half of the eelgrass with their byssal threads (which are little hairs that help them eat and cling to seaweed and rocks). This way they are protected from sea stars, whelks, crabs and other bottom feeders. The eelgrass also shelters the scallops during a storm. So Save the Bay *saved* the eelgrass so that the spat could grow up in the protection of the eelgrass.

Save the Bay's program is working very well - they found almost 2,000 spat in the mesh bags! This was their goal for 2010. So now the population is almost self-sufficient. So next time you find a scallop on the beach be happy - it means that the scallops are at a healthy population



Welcome to the first ever Minecraft Monthly! Today I'm going to tell you what to do in a Minecraft world. You need to find a tree and collect its wood and, saplings and then make a wooden pickaxe and mine some stone. You also have to find some food like a cow, a pig, a chicken, or zombies. You also have to find a light source and build a shelter. For a light source you need coal and sticks to make torches or you can burn logs to make charcoal and make a torch for a light source. You also want to make a shelter. You can find a cave and make home there. To make a home you need a crafting table, a chest, a bed, a furnace, a door, a roof over your head. 



Jamestown Cannibals

When we went to DC we saw this cool Bones Exhibit at the Museum of Natural History. Well, when we first arrived it seemed that Dr. Kari (one of the forensic anthropologists who work at the museum) was working on a skeleton that she quickly covered when we arrived. When we asked her what it was, she told us she wasn't ready to show this to the public eye just yet. Then this past month, Julianna received a newspaper article from her grandfather about a discovery Dr. Kari and her associate Dr. Doug Owsley had made. They had found solid evidence that cannibalism in the first colony in America-Jamestown V- had occurred. We believe that the skull we saw in Dr. Kari's office was the same skull they revealed to have solid evidence of cannibalism. We were so excited that we got a first glimpse of it, even though we didn't know what it was at the time.

I know what you're thinking; "That's gross! How could anyone eat a human being?!" but to understand the sort of mindset it takes to do such a horrible thing, you have to first understand the circumstances. The bones of the cannibalized remains date back to the years 1609-1610, which was known as the "starving time" in Jamestown. There was an enormous drought, the worst one to have occurred in 800 years, and the 6,000 people there were starving to death. The settlers were reduced to desperate measures; they would eat their horses, dogs, cats, rats. They even boiled up leather from shoes and belts to fill desperate stomachs.

The bones that the anthropologists uncovered were found in a cellar with trash and bones from a horse. The bones were identified as the remains of a 14-year-old girl, and it was immediately clear to Dr. Owsley that she had been cannibalized. There were violent chops to her limbs and head, in a desperate attempt to butcher her. There were also teeth marks etched into the bone. Her death was a casualty; she was eaten and then unceremoniously thrown in the dump to rot with garbage. And now 400 years later, her story can be told and that we could learn from her.




