


An unusually warm spring mixed with intermittent weeks of rain has created ponds and puddles that are perfect nurseries for the larvae of the mosquito. The rainwater gathers in puddles and pools and are where the mosquitoes lay their eggs, and the next week of hot weather speed the growth rate. That paired with the abundant food sources and we have the ideal mosquito breeding ground. Prevent these colonies of bloodsuckers by getting rid of any stagnant water in the area. Lotus has been found to kill off the larvae that grow in stagnant ponds and puddles if you're looking for a natural alternative.

As far as diet goes, most mosquitoes are selective about what's for dinner. There are only a few species that feed on humans and mammals. There are kinds that feed on birds, amphibians, reptiles. Only a few kinds don't really care; as long as it has a pulse, they'll feed off of it.

How the nuisances find their food, scientists are still puzzling about. There are a variety of cues that have been determined, not the least of which is sensing Carbon Dioxide. Using tiny eyes they can somewhat "see" their prey by comparing the target to the background. Some studies have shown that they smell certain hormones and natural odors such as Estrogen (sorry ladies) lactic acid (which is often produced when you exercise, or eat salty or potassium rich foods) and of course carbon dioxide. Quite a few amino acids such as alanine and lysine can attract different breeds of pests.


As there are certain scents that attract these miniature vampires with wings, there are also scents that repel them. DEET is the commonly known chemical and is present in several different kinds of store-bought repellants. DEET, or N, N-Diethyl-meta-toluamide, is not only dangerous for mosquitoes, but also humans though. Any more that 30% concentration and your liver might shrivel and die, as well as more than a few brain cells (15% of DEET is absorbed directly into the bloodstream!). There are several natural scents that have been found to annoy the enemy, including cinnamon, rosemary, catnip, cedar, garlic and of course citronella essential oils.

If we persist, the enemy will fall! Use any or all of the tactics above and help rid our Island haven of mosquitoes!





# <u>Intriguing Islander</u> of the Month


