The Prudence Island School Foundation was the recipient of Ocean State Charities Edward Ricci Award given at their Trustees May 27, 2014 meeting.



Tugging Along

If you've been anywhere near Homestead in the past month or so, you'll have noticed the enormous crane around the busy construction site that has taken up residency there. It's there for a reason - the new A&R dock. Floating next to all the hubbub is a tugboat named Hawk. That little tug has had a pretty interesting past. She used to be named the YTL-153 in her heyday when she served in the United States Navy. Laid down in 1940 at the Pearl Harbor Navy Yard she was launched and put in service in 1941. The YTL-153 was assigned to the 14th Naval District at Pearl Harbor. On December 7, 1941 the tugboat fought in the infamous Pearl Harbor attack. She was there taking on Japanese submarines with the best of them on that fateful day.

The YTL-153 was placed out of service on an unknown date and struck from the Naval Register in 1947. She was eventually sold for commercial use at an unknown point in time. In 2009 she was working for Specialty Diving Services, Inc. in North Kingstown, Rhode Island. She was reconfigured for her role as a construction dive boat, but originally the 65 foot boat held one diesel engine and a single propeller. Since Pearl Harbor, only *Hawk* and two other tugs are still around. However the two other tugboats are no longer in use, making *Hawk* the last known surviving Pearl Harbor boat still in use. To this day the boat is operated on a daily basis, continuing to tug along.

My New York Adventure of 2014




Schoolhouse 5K Walk/Run


