The Breakers

The Breakers is a big mansion that used to be a summer home for the Vanderbilt family. Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt established the steam engine and the New York Central Railroads. The mansion was built in 1885 but it was a wooden house that cost the Vanderbilt's around 450,000 dollars. Later, there was a fire in the mansion that destroyed it and an architect had to redo it and its frame in 1893. With the reconstruction was an update on all the furniture and appliances. The mansion has 70 rooms. Today the mansion would cost 12.5 million dollars.

The house sits on a 14 acre estate right on the ocean where huge waves come in and crash against the shore (hence the name "The Breakers"). The mansion is 125,339 square feet and gets 450,000 visitors a year.

My school and I had just recently visited The Breakers and we had a really great time. When you get there, you walk through big iron gates and follow a path that leads you up to the main doors of the mansion. When you walk in, you get a phone with headphones and you listen to a kid friendly tour guide who walks you through the importance and history of each room.

When we walked in, there was a big room with 50 foot ceilings with beautiful detailing all around, on the floors, the walls, and ceilings. There were many rooms to look at and each room had a different story. By the end of the tour we had seen many rooms filled with beautiful Christmas trees (we saw 17), large bathrooms, a grand staircase. We had lots of fun.

The overall experience was amazing and I would love to go back and see more of the mansions. I learned so many interesting things and got to see one of a kind art work and detailing that I will never forget. It is a place I would highly recommend, and I would definitely go back, given the chance.
